









AFRICAN BORN POPULATION




- Population has declined and poverty has increasednot surprisingly this also results in low levels of educational attainment and poor health.
- Immigrant population is growing particularly African immigrants – Southwest has become the cultural center of the community citywide



















MAIN TAKEAWAYS

- Largely residential community with good transit to major job centers
- Locally there are some job opportunities, mostly on the commercial corridors
- Larger employers that used to exist in the neighborhood, particularly around industry/manufacturing – have since left resulting in large number of vacant properties
- Some local crime hotspots need to be addressed in the broader city context it is not a major crime hotspot









Figure 13 Possible future scenario for planting at MMC



YEARS 2012 - 2014

The dataset was created through the following process:

1) Collect food retailer locations and data from various sources including Nielsen-Trade Dimensions, Get Healthy Philly, Environmental Health Services, and retailer websites.

2) Establish a scoring system for retailers reflecting the relative availability and quantity of healthy foods for sale by retailer type.

3) Determine a service area within which people would walk to shop at these retailers.

4) Create spatial walksheds reflecting these scores and service areas.

5) Calculate food access scores for each city block in raster format using map algebra and zonal statistics.







Sex by Age Comparison






Bartram Village Strategies

- Coordinate with redevelopment of Bartram Village Site. Opportunities for new / improved affordable housing, commercial space, educational facilities
- Coordinate with programming at Bartram Garden. Educational opportunities around gardening, nature, and new mussel hatchery
- Support the Woodland Academy new building
- Coordinate with PIDC Lower Schuylkill Development to make sure there are opportunities for local jobs.
- Cultural/educational opportunities at Watt Khmer Palelai
- Coordination between PAL Center, Kent Crest, School District of Philadelphia, & Richard Allen Prep on recreation facilities. Opportunity to improve police relations with the community
- Leverage federal Opportunity Zone designation.
- Create safer connections on key streets, particularly across Lindbergh Blvd. to Bartram's Village/Garden. Partner with SEPTA and Streets Department on Trolley Modernization.
